Direction of the country, Performance of the President, Government, MPs & Governance

Presented by:

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- The latest poll by Global InfoAnalytics suggests President Mahama's honeymoon might be over, although more than 2 in 3 voters still approve of his job performance as president.
- The poll saw the president's job approval declined from 73% in July to 67% in September, representing 6 points drop, it also shows 22% of voters disapprove of the president's while 11% did not have an opinion, resulting in net approval of +45%. Every region now approve of the job performance of the president; the first time our polling data has recorded such endorsement.
- On the direction of the country, though majority of voters believe the country is headed in the right direction, the September 2025 poll shows a decline from 71% in July 2025 to 66% in September 2025, representing a decline of 5 points. Though there is decline overall, the poll shows that majority of voters in all the regions now believe Ghana is headed in the right direction.
- For the government, voters continue to say the government is performing well as 18% rate their performance as excellent, 54% very good/good, 12% as average and 16% as poor/very poorly. The poll shaws an uptick in the proportion of voters who say the government has performed poor/very poor, increasing by 5 points compared to the July 2025 poll.



- The poll shows that majority of voters as happy with how their members of parliament have performed so far as 15% rate their performance as excellent, 52% as very good/good, 14% as average while 18% say they have performed poor/very poor.
- On voters' standard of living, the poll shows that 57% of voters say their standard of living has improved compared to a year ago. This represent a marginal decline of 2 points from the July 2025 poll which recorded 59%. 11% of voters say their standard of living has decline, down from 12% last July. Majority of voters in all the regions say their standard of living has improved compared to a year a go.
- □ 67% of voters believe their standards of living will improve in the next 12 months , down from 72% in July 2025 while 20% say it will not improve, up from 16% in July.
- On the state of corruption, 53% say it is improving, also down from 60% in July 2025 while 16% say it is getting worse, up from 13%, while those who say it is the same has increased from 20% in July 2025 to 24% in September 2025. However, the poll also shows that majority of voters in all the regions believe corruption levels have improved. 2025.



- On the fight against corruption, majority of voters believe the government is doing enough in the fight against corruption. 58% of voters say the government is doing enough in the fight against corruption while 29% say it is not doing enough. The poll shows that voters who believe the government is not doing enough is on the increase, rising from 23% to 29% between July 2025 and September 2025.
- The poll shows that majority of voters are happy with how their members of parliament have performed so far. 15% rate the performance of their MPs as excellent, 52% as very good/good, 14% as average while 18% say they have performed poor/very poor.
- The poll also shows that 27% of voters openly associate themselves with the NPP down from 30% in July 2025. The poll also shows the NDC declined from 44% to 42% in September 2025. Floating voters saw an increase of 2% to 17% in September while voters who don't disclose their party affiliations also went up from 8% in July 2025 to 10% in September 2025.
- The poll also shows that nearly 70% of voters use social media while 30% do not have social media account. The poll also shows that of those who are on social media, 28% use Facebook, 27% use TikTok, Snapchat 13%, X, 12%, Instagram, 10% and others, 10%.



- In what could significant development in future elections, the poll shows that Gen Z and Millennial voters (voters under 44 years of age) account for nearly voters account for nearly 78% of voters. The poll also shows that 64% of voters prefer Ghana to elect young leaders compared to 12% who oppose electing young leader while 24% were neutral.
- The poll was conducted between 15th September to 23rd September 2025 with a sample of 9,509 voters using mix mode (telephone and face-to-face) and has a confidence level of 99% and margin of error of ±1.30%.
- A total of 1997 voters were sampled using Computer Assisted Telephone Interviews (CATI) 1,997 and 7,512 face-to-face interviews across eighty-three (83) constituencies in all the 16 regions.





SAMPLE ALLCOTION-PERCENTAGE














